The Chittenden County Courtbouse, designed by Burlington architect E. C. Ryer, was completed in 1872. The new facility was erected to replace the old courthouse built in 1829.

The building, constructed in Second Empire style, is two and one half stories high and is rectangular in plan. A three story tower is located at the northwest corner of the structure. The walls are constructed of blocks of local redstone in combination with blue-grey Isle La Motte Stone. The stories are divided on the exterior by chisled stone belt courses. The quoins, window arches, cornices and chimney caps are all executed in cut stone. The first floor is lined by double windows divided by a band of stone and capped by stone double arches. The second story contains the large roman arched windows which light the courtroom and chambers. The structure is surmounted by a bracketed cornice and mansard roof. Several recessed, pedimented dormers, alternating with the chimneys on the side elevations, are located along the mansard roof. The roof is sheathed with light and dark bands of rectangular, clipped and scalloped slate shingles.

The courthouse is entered via a round arched entranceway with a paneled hardwood door. The entrance is proceeded by a flight of steps leading to a one story stone porch. Two sets of triple stone columns support the porch roof which has a bracketed cornice surmounted by a balustrade.

The tower roof takes the form of what is referred to in contemporary accounts as a "French Dome", square at the base and octagonal at the top. This "French Dome" has louvered dormers, is also sheathed with colored bands of slates, and is encircled at the top by an ornamental iron railing.

Of particular interest in the interior is the second floor courtroom. It is approached via a carved and polished hardwood main staircase. The courtroom is entered through an elaborately paneled round arched hardwood door surmounted by a semi-circular window of glass etched with an allegorical design.

The room measures 50 feet by 47 feet by 21 feet. This large space is fully wainscoted and paneled. The walnut bench is located in a shallow arched recess in the east wall. The room is lit by six large round arched windows and has an ornate stamped metal coiling.

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The building, along with the Smith-Goldberg U.S. Army Reserve Center just to the north, forms an important architectural nucleus in rapidly changing downtown Burlington.


