

URBAN DISTRICT BUILDING INVENTORY

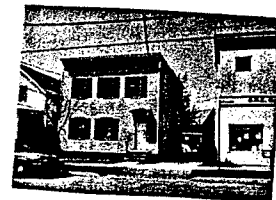
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269 North Winooski Avenue, c. 1875

A 2-story, vernacular Italianate building with a flat roof bracketed cornice and front sidehall entrance. The entrance is sheltered by a hipped door hood supported by large carved brackets with pendants, similar to those found along the cornice. The fenestration is 2/2 wood sash throughout and the building is clad in aluminum siding. The house sits on a stone foundation.

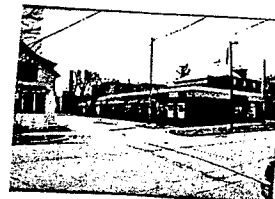


a. Garage, c. 1880

 A 1-story, 1 bay, shed roof garage with wood clapboards and hinged cross-braced wood doors.

274 North Winooski Avenue, c. 1921

A large, sprawling commercial complex built of brick and concrete block. The original portions of the complex consist of a 1-story brick loading dock with an industrial smokestack and another 2-story brick building with a decorative brick cornice and corner pilasters. All were once part of Edward Francis Dry Cleaning business and later c. 1930 part of the Vermont Cleaning Company. The central 2-story, 4x3 bay concrete block structure, as well as the 1-story concrete block storefront, were all added later c. 1960's/70's. It was recently the home of the Onion River Food Co-op market. The older brick buildings of the complex have been obscured by additions and are barely visible at the rear and south sides of the complex.



280 North Winooski Avenue, c. 1875

A 2-story vernacular gable roof house with a 1-story shed roof enclosed porch on the primary (west) street facade. Two, shed roof wall dormers project from the gable slopes, one on each side. A 1-story shed roof addition extends from the rear of the building. The fenestration is symmetrical 6/6 sash throughout and the house is clad in aluminum siding. The building is now vacant and slated for demolition.
