### REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS: INSTALLATION OF HOLIDAY, WINTER & SUMMER LIGHTING ON THE CHURCH STREET MARKETPLACE, FY 18 – 20 DUE FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 22, 2017

### I. INTRODUCTION

You're invited to respond to this Request for Proposal for installation of Holiday, Winter and Summer Lights on the Church Street Marketplace, for a three-year period, beginning Fall, 2017 and ending in the Spring, 2020. Proposals are due to the Marketplace by Friday, September 15, 2017.

### YOU ARE ENCOURAGED TO BID ON EITHER PROJECT #1, PROJECT #2 or BOTH.

#### PROJECT # 1: BUCKET TRUCK INSTALLATIONS FOR HOLIDAYS, WINTER LIGHTS, SUMMER LIGHTS. THIS PROJECT INCLUDES:

- A) Stringing Lights on 40 LARGE TREES on all four blocks for the 2017 and 2019 Holidays;
- B) Stringing Lights and Garland at Four Intersections for the Holidays;
- C) Assisting CSM in securing Christmas Tree at private residence in Greater Burlington Area;
- D) Removing lights from Christmas Tree and removing tree from Church Street by the end of the first week of January; Hanging Light Strands;
- E) Installing 28 FT, 12 Socket Light Strands on the steel cables at each of Church Streets four intersections: Main, College, Bank and Cherry

### PROJECT # 2: LADDER INSTALLATIONS FOR HOLIDAYS, WINTER LIGHTS AND SUMMER LIGHTS. INCLUDES:

- A) Stringing Lights on 45 SMALL Trees on all four blocks of Church Street;
- B) INSTALLING 28 FT, 12 Socket Light Strands ON CHURCH STREET'S STEEL & GLASS CANOPIES on all four blocks;
- C) changing out bulbs under Church Street's steel and glass canopies prior to WINTER LIGHTS (January);

### D)Changing out Bulbs in 12 Socket Light Strands for SUMMER LIGHTS (May)

### I. ABOUT CHURCH STREET AND ITS LIGHTING PROGRAMS

### CHURCH STREET MARKETPLACE IS COMPOSED OF FOUR BLOCKS

City Hall BlockChurch Street between Main and College StreetsSecond BlockChurch Street between College and Bank StreetsMall BlockChurch Street between Bank and Cherry StreetsTop BlockChurch Street between Cherry and Pearl Streets

THERE ARE 42 LARGE TREES AND 35 SMALL TREES ON THE FOUR BLOCKS OF CHURCH STREET. A lighting contractor decorates small trees with two workers and one 16 foot ladder and one 6-10 foot ladder. To decorate our large trees with light strands, a contractor requires two workers and a bucket truck

THERE ARE STEEL CABLES AT FOUR INTERSECTIONS – MAIN, COLLEGE, BANK AND CHERRY STREETS. During the Holidays, our contractor installs garland and light strands on these steel cables at these four intersections. For the January, 2018, a contractor will install 28 foot, 12 socket light strands plus bulbs of a certain color for Winter. For the Summer, a contractor will change out the light bulbs in the intersections.

THERE ARE STEEL AND GLASS CANOPIES ON EACH OF CHURCH STREET'S FOUR BLOCKS. These steel and glass canopies were installed in 1981 to shield pedestrians from snow and rain. A contractor will 28 foot, 12 socket light strands on the steel I-Beams in January, 2018. The contractor contractor changes will change out the bulbs for Winter Lights and for Summer Lights

EVERY CHRISTMAS, WE INSTALL A 40-45 FOOT BLUE SPRUCE TREE AT THE TOP OF CHURCH STREET. The tree is donated by a local family or business. We retrieve the tree with the help of DeMag Riggers transport it to Church Street. This job requires chain saw and two workers who are experienced working with a large rigger. Contractor cuts down the tree and grinds the stump. Our lighting contractor will then decorate the tree with 250 light strands – strands are installed vertically, spaced about 1 inch apart.



### Church & Main Intersection




# **Church & College Intersection**


## **Church & Bank Intersection**


**Church & Cherry Intersection**

### VI. HOW WE INSTALL LIGHTS IN LARGE TREES AND SMALL TREES

Set up begins in mid-October and must be completed on the Monday before Black Friday (Black Friday is the Friday immediately following Thanksgiving Day and official kick off of the Holiday season.) FOR LARGE TREES, person in bucket passes new light strand to person in tree. Person in tree PLUGS strand into electrical outlet. Person in bucket drops strand over canopy, letting the extra dangle at the tree canopy. Then, person in bucket grabs extra length and brings strand back towards the middle on the outside of the tree canopy. We call this process the "Fireworks" look.





FOR SMALL TREES.

One 16 foot ladder and 6-10 foot ladder are required. One person is closer and lower to the middle of the trees. Second person is higher, feeding lights down the middle of the tree. Remember, we are not attaching lights to our trees. We are laying the lights into the tree.

THE PROCESS OF DECORATING THE TREES IN THE PLANTERS IN FRONT OF CITY HALL ON CHURCH STREET requires the same techniques on the street. (In the past, this was accomplished in 3.5 to 4 days, including decorating the tree in front of City Hall.) First, the power outlet is located across the street from City Hall and getting this set up is key to the job running smoothly. All the brushes, shrubs, and trees are wired like those up and down the Marketplace.

### VII. INSTALLING GARLAND AND LIGHTS ON THE STEEL CABLES AT THE MAIN, COLLEGE, BANK AND CHERRY STREET INTERSECTIONS

- Garland is provided by the Marketplace and arrives pre-cut and labeled for each intersection and light post. Each of the four intersections (Main, College, Bank and Cherry) are decorated with garland and lights. College, Bank and Cherry Street intersections are full four sided, three-dimensional overheads. Main Street intersection is a single two-dimensional plane across Church Street, where the Marketplace ends at Main Street.
- Lights and garland can be wrapped at the same time, by two people, working together in the bucket.
- First, the garland is wrapped around the 8 major lines that outlay the overheads, using zip ties to secure to the bare steel wire. Garland is also wrapped around the pole rising from the center.
- Garland is NOT wrapped around the support strands.
- After garland is in place, lights are wrapped around the garland. Each intersection should incorporate 30-35 sets of lights. Each side of the intersection overhead should use approximately 4 sets of lights. Two of the three sets of lights should be used to decorate the center pole. (In the past, each intersection required 1.5 days to complete.)
- The Main Street intersection is decorated by wrapping garland around the top and bottom guide wires and then looping garland between the two. (See figure 3). The loops need to be evenly spaced and precise because the garland is pre-cut accordingly. Once the garland is up, lights are wrapped around garland as before. This intersection should use 25 sets of lights.

### COMPLIANCE WITH CITY ORDINANCES, INCLUDING LIVEABLE WAGE:

A successful proposal to provide goods and services to the City must comply with all City ordinances, in addition to any applicable state or Federal laws. LIVABLE WAGE EXPLAINED: In November of 2001, the City Council enacted an ordinance whose intention it was to provide a minimum level of compensation for city employees and employees of entities that enter into service contracts or receive financial assistance from the City of Burlington.

Annually in May the livable wage is re-calculated. The re-calculated rates then becomes effective on July 1 of that same year.

The city is committed, through its contracts with vendors and provision of financial assistance, to encourage the private sector to pay its employees a livable wage and contribute to employee health care benefits.

- 1) *Contractor* or *vendor* is a person or entity that has a contract with the City of Burlington primarily for the furnishing of services (as opposed to the purchasing of goods) where the total amount of the contract or contracts exceeds fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) for any twelve-month period, including any subcontractors of such contractor or vendor.
- 2) Covered employer means the City of Burlington (except that the Burlington School Department shall not be considered a covered employer), a contractor or vendor or a grantee as defined above.
- 3) *Covered employee* means an "employee" as defined below, who is employed by a "covered employer," subject to the following:
  - a) An employee who is employed by a contractor or vendor is a "covered employee" during the period of time he or she expends on furnishing services funded by the city, notwithstanding that the employee may be a seasonal employee;
  - b) An employee who is employed by a grantee who expends at least half of his or her time on activities funded by the city is a "covered employee." Every covered employee shall pay each and every covered employee at least a livable wage as established under this article.
  - c) Effective July 1, 2017: The Burlington Livable Wage Ordinance requires that if you are working on a specific City of Burlington service contract or subcontract above a certain amount your employer must pay you at least \$14.24 an hour if the employer offers health insurance
  - d) If you are working on a specific City of Burlington service contract or subcontract above a certain amount your employer must pay you at least \$15.83 an hour if the employer does not offer health insurance.

### BURLINGTON'S UNION DETERRENCE ORDINANCE

### ARTICLE VIII. UNION DETERRENCE

21-100 Policy. It is the policy of the City of Burlington to limit letting contracts to organizations that provide union deterrence services to other companies.

(Ord. of 3-27-06/4-26-06)

21-101 Definitions.

(a) Contractor or vendor. A person or entity that has a contract with the City of Burlington primarily for the furnishing of services (as opposed to the purchasing of goods), including any subcontractors of such contractor or vendor.

(b) Government funded project. Any contract for services which involves any City funds and the total amount of the contract is fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) or more. Burlington School Department contracts shall not be considered government funded projects under this article. (c) Union deterrence services. Services provided by a contractor, subcontractor or vendor that are not restricted to advice concerning what activities by an employer are prohibited and permitted by applicable laws and regulations, but extend beyond such legal advice to encouraging an employer to do any of the following:

1) Hold captive audience, (i.e., mandatory) meetings with employees encouraging employees to vote against the union;

2) Have supervisors force workers to meet individually with them to discuss the union;

3) Imply to employees, whether through written or oral communication, that their employer may have to shut down or lay people off if the union wins the election;

4) Discipline or fire workers for union activity;

5) Train managers on how to dissuade employees from supporting the union.

(d) Substantial portion of income. For the purposes of this article, substantial portion of income shall mean greater than ten (10) percent of annual gross revenues or one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00), whichever is less.

21-102 Implementation.

(a) No contract for a government funded project shall be let to any contractor, subcontractor, or vendor who

1) Advises or has advised an employer to conduct any illegal activity in its dealings with a union. 2) Advertises union deterrence services as specialty services;

3) Earns a substantial portion of its income by providing union deterrence services to other companies in order to defeat union organizing efforts.

(b) Prior to the commencement of work on a government funded project a contractor, subcontractor or vendor shall provide written certification that it has not advised the conduct of any illegal activity, it does not currently, nor will it over the life of the contract provide union deterrence services in violation of this article.

21-103 Enforcement.

(a) Any contractor, subcontractor or vendor who files false or materially misleading information in connection with an application, certification or request for information pursuant to the provisions of this article or provided union deterrence services during the life of a contract for a government funded project shall be deemed to be in violation of this article.

(b) The City of Burlington shall have the right to modify, terminate and or seek specific performance of any contract for a government funded project if the contractor, subcontractor or vendor has not complied with this article.

With respect to all operations performed by the CONTRACTOR, SUBCONTRACTORs, agents or workers, it is the CONTRACTOR's responsibility to insure that general liability insurance coverage, on an occurrence form, provides all major divisions of coverage including, but not limited to and with limits not less than:

- 1. Premises Operations
- 2. Independent CONTRACTORS' Protective
- 3. Products and Completed Operations
- 4. Personal Injury Liability
- 5. Contractual Liability
- 6. Broad Form Property Damage
- 7. Medical Expenses
- 8. Collapse, Underground and Explosion Hazards

1. General Aggregate	\$2,000,000
2. Products-Completed/Operations Aggregate	\$2,000,000
3. Personal & Advertising Injury	\$1,000,000
4. Each Occurrence	\$1,000,000
5. Fire Damage (Any one fire)	\$ 250,000
6. Med. Expense (Any one person)	\$ 5,000

WORKERS' COMPENSATION: With respect to all operations performed, the CONTRACTOR shall carry workers compensation insurance in accordance with the laws of the State of Vermont and ensure that all SUB-CONTRACTORs and SUBCONTRACTORs carry the same workers' compensation insurance for all work performed by them under this contract. Minimum limits for Employer's Liability:

(a) Bodily Injury by Accident: \$500,000 each accident

(b) Bodily Injury by Disease: \$500,000 policy limit, \$500,000 each employee
